Congratulations to Samuel Gostomski, Outstanding Job!

Samuel Gostomski, BHS senior and Bandera County 4-H member, participated in the Texas Science and Engineering Fair at the Henry B. Gonzales Convention Center in San Antonio, TX. The Texas Science and Engineering Fair is the state's largest science fair competition, drawing 1,100 students in grade 6-12 from 12 regional science fairs. The students were interviewed by a series of industry and academic experts in their respective fields. After 4 hours of

judging, it was announced that Gostomski qualified for the Blue Ribbon Round, the championship drive, by placing first in a group of 36 projects .Samuel also competed at the Intel International Science and Engineering Fair on May 9-15 in Pittsburgh, PA after winning 2nd Grand in Life Sciences at the Alamo Regional Academy of Science and Engineering. Intel ISEF is the largest science fair in the world with over 1,700 high school students competing from over 78 countries and regions.

Samuel presented his project, "Miticide Microencapsulation: Evaluating the effect of microencapsulation of thymol based miticide treatments on honey bee (Apis mellifera) colonies," to a group of animal science industry leaders and research experts from around the world. Samuel ended up placing 3rd in Animal Sciences and won a \$1,000 cash prize. To date Samuel has earned over \$275,000 in scholarships, prizes, and travel to various industry groups, international prize ceremonies, and science competitions. Samuel will be attending Baylor University in the Fall.

Youth Agriculture Lifetime Leadership (YALL)

The Youth Agricultural Lifetime Leadership program is a production agriculture tour for high school aged youth. It will encompass a 6 day exploration to West Texas and the South Plains. Youth will be exposed to several aspects of livestock and crop production from a commercial standpoint. Below is a tentative outline —

Sunday, July 26th – Depart from Kerrville at 12 noon. Travel to Lubbock, Texas Tech University for dinner and presentation.

Monday, July 27th – Tour the AgriLife Research and Extension Center at Lubbock and learn about crop production in the South Plains. Crops include cotton, corn, grain sorghum, peanuts, sesame, sunflowers, alfalfa and black eyed peas. Tour a local farm to learn about irrigation practices and technologies. That afternoon, tour the Texas Tech Meats Lab and learn about pork fabrication.

<u>Tuesday, July 28th</u> – Visit Del Rio Dairy, Hi Pro Feed Mill and Keeling Cattle Feeders. Travel to Canyon that evening for dinner and a visit to West Texas A&M University.

Wednesday, July 29th – Visit Timber Creek Veterinary Hospital and the AQHA Museum. That evening, travel to Palo Duro Canyon for dinner and the "Texas" play.

<u>Thursday, July 30th</u> – Travel to Childress to visit Bradley 3 Ranch. That afternoon, travel to San Angelo. Visit Angelo State University for social and dinner.

<u>Friday, July 31st</u> – Visit Bollman Wool Scouring Plant, Chico Denise Sheep Feedlot and the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension and Research Center. That afternoon, depart for Kerrville, arrive by 5:00 p.m.

Thirty youth will be selected from across District 10. The cost is \$200/participant and will cover travel, hotel and meals. Nearly \$20,000 has been raised to support this program. Several agents have worked hard to put this program together and we're excited with the opportunities that it presents. If you are interested in attending, contact the Extension Office by Friday, June 12th.

Livestock Project Reminders

Health - consider collecting stool samples on your projects (especially lambs and goats) and work with your veterinarian on a preventative health program. Some of your projects may need a booster so find out what was administered and when. Be mindful of internal parasites. Cattle should be wormed every 100 days, lambs and goats every 30 days.

Feed - cattle should be eating around 2% of their body weight a day. Lambs and goats should be consuming 2-3%. Be consistent with the amount you feed daily along with your feeding schedule.

Water - keep a constant supply of clean, fresh water available at all times.

Facilities - make sure your pens are safe and keep them clean. Your projects need to have a cool comfortable place to get out of the sun.

Showmanship - while you have some time this summer, practice with your projects. Tie, brush, handle, lead, brace, etc...

Livestock Project Leaders

Volunteers play a very important role in providing guidance and direction to 4-H livestock project work. Without dedicated volunteers, program opportunities would be limited and youth would miss out on valuable learning experiences. We are in need of some volunteers to provide leadership to the sheep, goat and swine projects. If you have an interest in serving as a volunteer leader, please contact the Extension Office.







Expected Program Outcomes

Participants will have the opportunity to see production practices many have never seen. Hopefully this will give an insight to career opportunities some might not have considered. Evaluation Methods

Participants will be evaluated on a post evaluation that will measure their increased knowledge to the specific programs covered on the tours. They will also answer open ended questions on how the tour will impact their future career choices, and why.

The Youth Agricultural Lifetime Leadership opportunity is a 6 day exploration for youth in District 10 to experience West Texas agricultural production.

4-H members that have a strong interest in production agriculture who are outgoing high school freshmen through outgoing seniors are invited to apply.

30 youth will be selected by application and notified by July 1, 2015.

Youth Agricultural Lifetime Leadership

Participants will learn the value of technology in livestock and crop production from a commercial perspective. Crop related technology will include the role genetic modification plays in reducing production costs to producers and helps in limiting the use of pesticides.



Participants will also see the importance technology plays in dairy production from a feed monitoring standpoint to its role in milk production monitoring of dairy cattle.



The importance of embryo transfer and artificial insemination will also be discussed, as well as the role it plays in improving profitability and beef quality.

TEXAS 4-H LIVESTOCK AMBASSADORS

The Texas 4-H Livestock Ambassador program strives to provide high school aged 4-H members the opportunity to develop and practice advanced leadership skills related to mentoring other youth, and to become advocates for animal agriculture.

Leadership

Students completing the requirements to become a Texas 4-H Livestock Ambassador become accountable to his/her County Extension Agent, their community and the program. Ambassadors must contribute 40 hours of service in presenting topics in agricultural advocacy, nutrition, selection, daily maintenance and care, showmanship, sportsmanship, preparing new 4-H families for show, and management of show animals during a livestock show. Additionally, the ambassadors teach livestock ethics and animal care to the novice 4-H families. An online reporting system allows the program to capture the educational efforts of the unique leaders. The results have been incredible.

Knowledge

Selected students are exposed to rigorous college level animal science. The "Short Courses" on the campuses of Texas Tech University and Texas A&M University are the settings where the educational experiences occur. Professors and Extension Specialists lead the students through the advanced curriculum. The professors provide questions contributing to the 200 question final exam the students must pass with an 80%. Purposeful construction of the curriculum; fused with a commitment to hands on learning have generated exceptional knowledge gained outcomes. Since 2010, 150 students have completed the exam, 149 have passed.

Career Development

The program exposes youth to a diverse array of career opportunities in degree programs from the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at Texas A&M and the College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources at Texas Tech University. Testimonials were given regarding the power of a degree in agricultural education with respect to job interviews, placement

and competition. Students make valuable contacts with people that offer assistance in career development. Industry representatives provide contact information to students and as Ambassadors they were granted unique access to leaders in Texas Agriculture through program activities. Below are outcomes regarding career development:

- In 2010, in a research study, students were tested on his/her livestock production knowledge before and after the short course. The exam was 100 questions, multiple choice and short answer. The average before was 49% and elevated to an outstanding 75% at the conclusion of the course. Further investigating knowledge gained students received a livestock production expertise instrument administered pre and post
- 93% of Livestock Ambassadors enroll in the college of agriculture
- 87% are interested in a career in agriculture
- "My experiences in the program will benefit me in agriculture or any other career"
- "This program changed my career path...I love agriculture more"
- The program plans on following the students through college as they enter the workforce.
